If you go to one of these new shopping malls, it used to be market sellers shouting out. Now there's someone with a microphone shouting, 'If I say Vodaphone, you say Hutch' and the crowds come gathering around.

I've been on three English courses – American, British and Australian. English can get you the whole world here. The US one taught us

to roll our 'r's, but so many people say, 'don't put on that accent; talk to me in an Indian accent' or 'please talk slowly' because Indians talk so fast.

Out of 80 to 100 calls a day several are abusive. Many people hear my accent and put the phone down. Britishers, well the truth is, they get very upset. Many would shout 'you've taken our jobs' and put the phone down. We have to read a legal script, 'Anything said against us will be taken up in a court of law'.

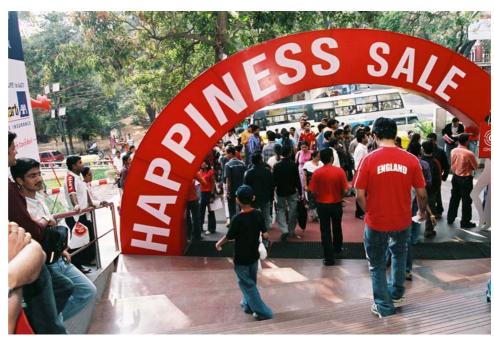
