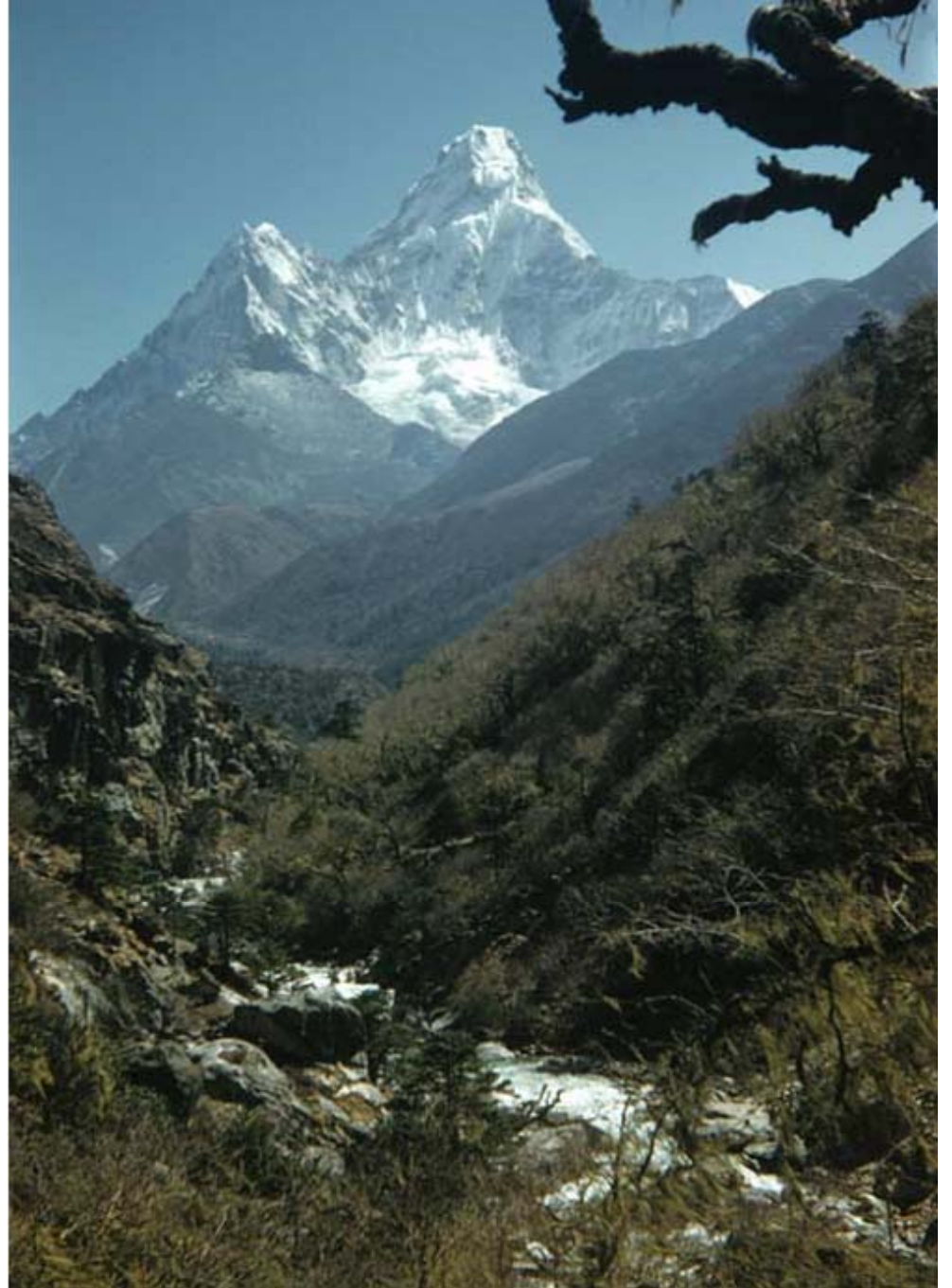

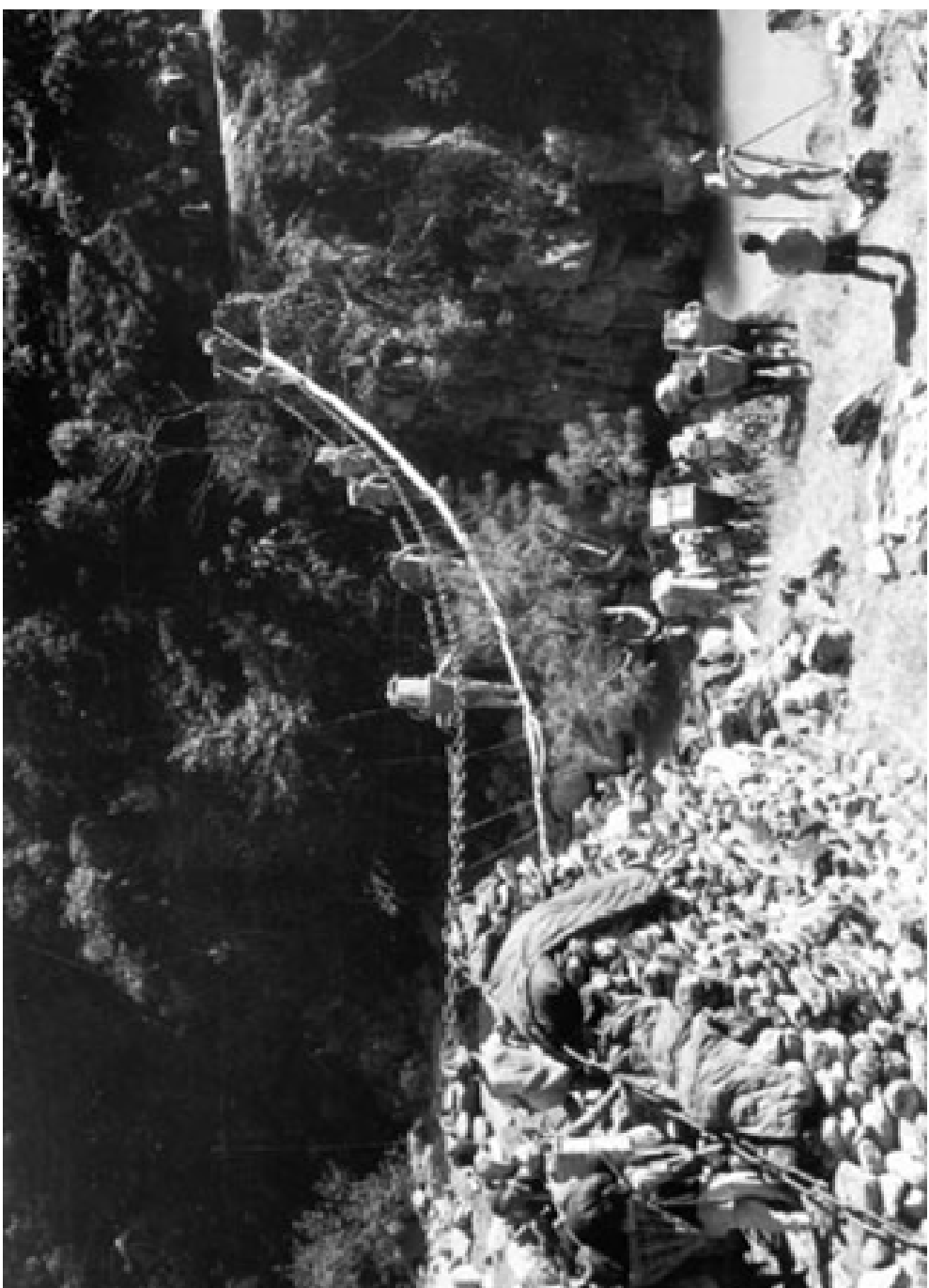

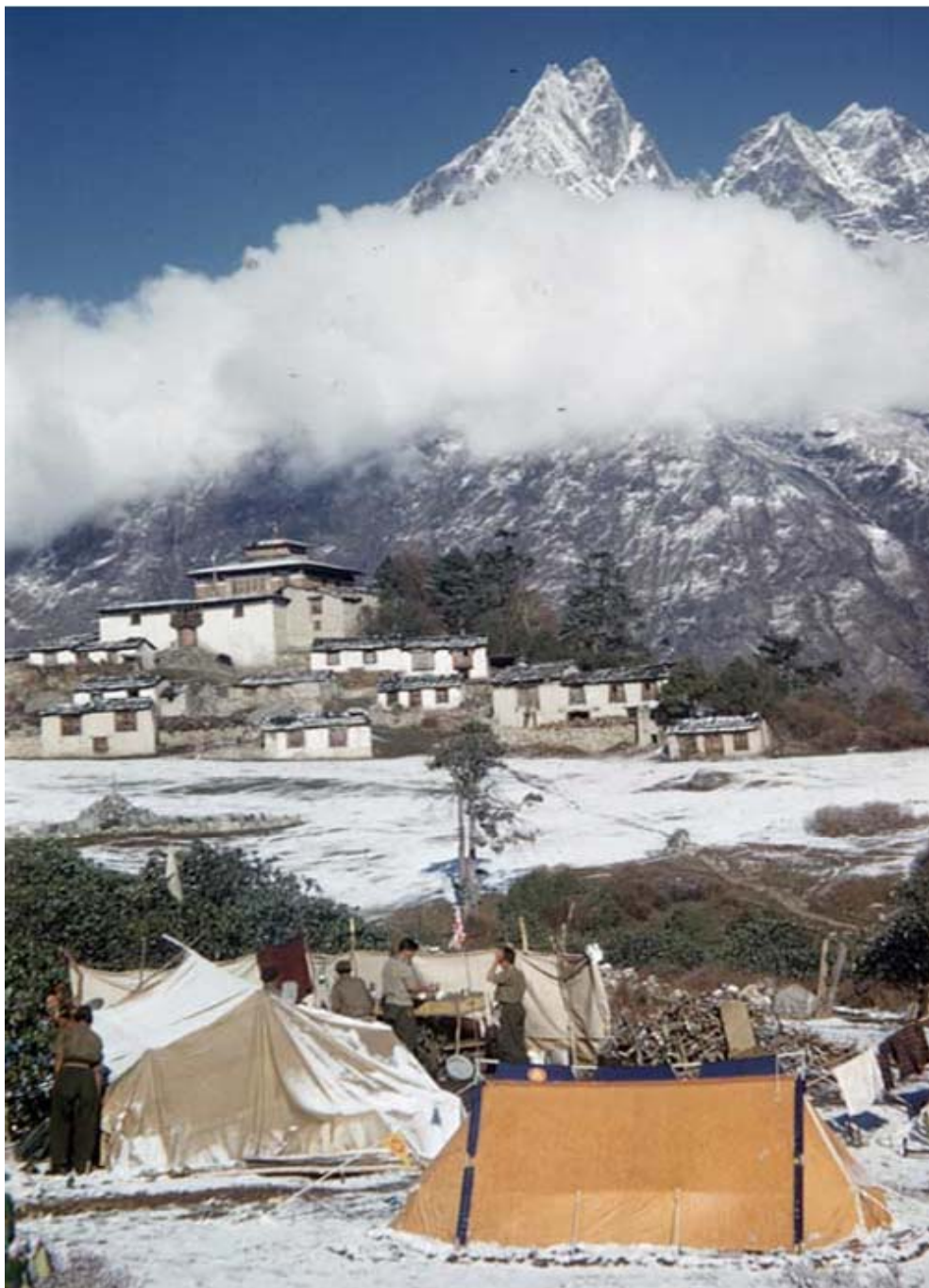

SELF MEASUREMENT FORM.

INSTRUCTIONS FOR SELF MEASUREMENTS.

The surface of the feet is above all, most helpful. This is to be taken wearing slippers less than the broadest part measurement of foot. The pencil to be held in a vertical position, following the contour of the plan of the foot. The outline to be taken standing, with normal weight evenly distributed between the two feet. An accurate straight line of weight given upon a false width to the heel of the foot. If possible, a second person should be employed to take the outline; this reduces the risk of any serious distortion.

The following four measurements should be taken, again wearing the full complement of socks and underwear but without the weight on the feet.

(1) The last measure to be taken **ROUND** the complete girth of the largest part of the foot at the point of the maximum swell, incorporating the ball of the great toe and the pad immediately behind the little toe. The tape at this point to be held **TIGHT**.

(2) The next to be taken round the highest point of the arch, approximately half way along the foot. This to be taken with the tape held **FABLYE** tight.

(3) The last measure to be taken round the rim of the heel, the measurement point being the lowest. In other words, the smallest measure the tape can make, incorporating the rim of the heel. Again, the tension to be taken holding the tape **FABLYE** tight.

(4) The ankle measure to be taken at the narrowest point immediately above the ankle bone. This to be taken with the tape held **FABLYE** tight as for the joint measure.

(5) Chest size worn in normal dress (see clothing table).



N.B.—All these measures to be taken **ROUND** complete girth of Foot Ankle, etc.

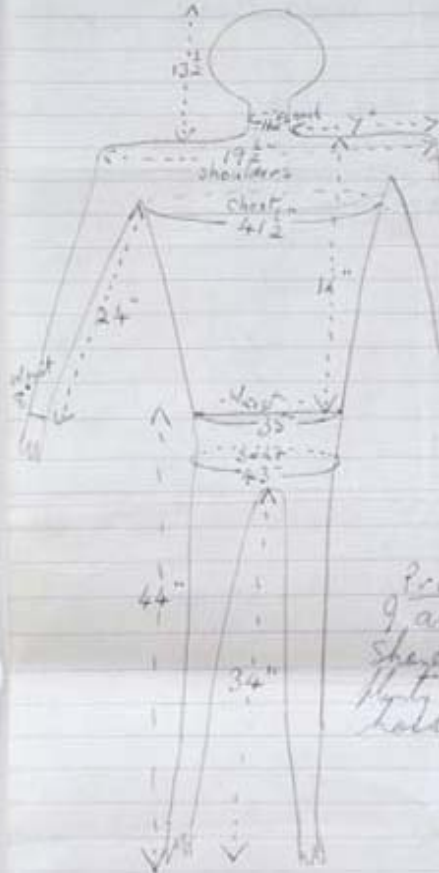
